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

This pavilion in southern Germany was commissioned privately – a folly of the kind that populated 18th-century landscaped gardens in England. The building is constructed from planed boards of larch wood that create a homogenous façade and interior surface. When not in use, the pavilion is closed with shutters made of highly polished stainless steel. A series of deep set openings and niches in the façade and interior provide spaces for seating, and a roof terrace is accessed via a ladder.
